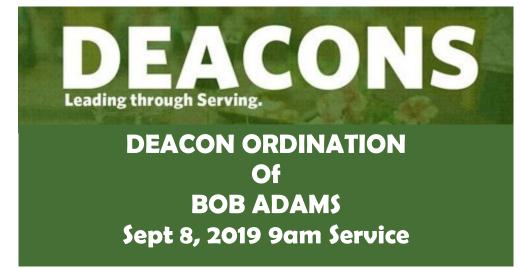

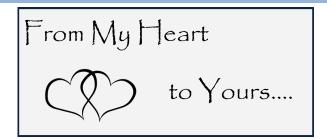

## **September Memory Verse**

Since you are my rock and my fortress, for the sake of your name lead and guide me. Psalm 31:3



As I write this week, Hurricane Dorian has already brought vast destruction to the Bahamas and it remains to be seen how close it will come to the coast of Florida. Instead of waiting to see what this unpredictable storm might do, all the potentially effected states are in preparedness mode—boards on windows, sandbags, extra water, batteries, generators as well as just leaving your living quarters. It reminds me that preparedness is a major theme in the New Testament. Of course, not hurricane prep but of being prepared to meet God.

Not a fun though, but the truth is, that meeting can take place at a moments notice on any day, even today! Over the past weekend the reminder signs were there for us not only with Dorian but in the random killings in Odessa, TX and in the boat fire off the coast of California. I cannot imagine that any of those scuba divers dreamed it would be the last trip of their earthly lives. Were any of them thinking about their readiness or lack of readiness to meet God? We cannot know, yet we can know from Scripture that we are advised and warned to live in a state of spiritual preparedness. Matthew 24:42, 44, "Therefore keep watch, because you do not know on what day your Lord will come. <sup>44</sup>So you also must be ready, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him. Matthew 25:13 Therefore keep watch, because you do not know the day or the hour. I John 2:28 And now, dear children, continue in him, so that when he appears we may be confident and unashamed before him at his coming.

As we looked last Sunday at ICorinthians 3:10-15, we saw that there is a "coming day" when we will stand before the Lord and our works will be reviewed and evaluated as to their eternal durability. Am I invested each day in the kingdom of God in someway that I will be prepared if that coming day were today? Or would I be unprepared because too much of my time is given to worldly pursuits that make no spiritual difference in the long run?

What does spiritual readiness look like? Some thoughts... I certainly would not be ready to meet the Lord if I have known sin in my life that I embrace instead of asking for God's cleansing grace and His help to forsake it. I would want to be maintaining a closeness to the Lord with daily prayer and Scripture reading. I would want the Lord to know that my life is fully available to Him to do His service. I could not have confidence in His presence if I had neglected my witness to those in my family or social circle. I would be prepared by not allowing any bitterness to reside in my heart. I am prepared to meet Christ when I am relying not upon my own righteousness to give me good standing, but only on His grace alone.

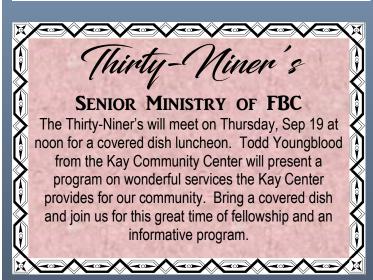

I have had the pleasure of becoming the chaplain of the Fort Valley Middle School football team. I started last week by speaking to the team before their first game. It was a great experience that I look forward to continuing. But since this week is the first week of college

football (even though I wish my team could have a do-over) I thought I'd share with you all the same principle I gave the football team last week. I talked to the team about self-discipline. Here's some of what I said:

"When it comes to football, it's about matchups. It's about beating the guy you're responsible for beating. It's about being better than the guy in front of you. But here's the thing, you can't control how big the other person is, or how strong they are, or how fast they are. You can't control what guy that you are matched up against.

So then what can you control? The answer is yourself. You can only control what you do. How well you play. The passion and fire and heart that you play with. You can't keep the guy you're matched up against from spending time in the weight room, but you can keep yourself in check and make sure that you're doing everything to keep your body in the proper shape. You can't keep the guy across from you from hydrating properly, but you can make sure you do. You can't make the guy across from you from playing hard on every snap, but you can make sure you give every play your all.

The same is true in every aspect of our lives. We can do our absolute best to control the environment around us, but it just doesn't work that way. You don't get to control the amount of homework you get, or how hard your tests are, but you do get to control how hard you work in the classroom and at home studying.

You can't keep the people around you from doing things that make you mad, but you can control how you react. You can't control how you're treated, but you can control how you treat others.

For the rest of your life, you are going to be tasked with keeping yourself in check. One day you'll get old, and you'll have bills and a family to take care of and the only way to be able to that is if you start learning now that YOU are responsible for the direction of your life. In Proverbs 25:28 it says: 'A man without self-discipline is like a city broken into and left without walls.' As long as we blame the actions of others, or the size of our problems, we will never get past the obstacles in our way. So today I just want you to take this with you: You are responsible for you. Today, on the football field, you have to do your job. You have to take responsibility for yourself.

You want to do big things? Then start by making sure you do what you need to do to get there, regardless of what anybody else is doing, because you aren't responsible for them. You are responsible for you."
